I was not looking forward to returning to Great Neck after I graduated from the University of Maryland in 2010. I longed to return to the large sprawling campus, good friends, and my own apartment. In the midst of these transitions and changes, one ques-

tion always lingered in the back of my mind: where will I find a Jewish community now?

It was impossible for me not to connect with Judaism at the University of Maryland, College Park. Friday night services were filled with beauty and passion, Jews could be seen walking all around campus to attend *Shabbat* services and meals, and the unparalleled aroma of *Shabbat* dinner permeated the halls of many apartment buildings. The University of Maryland was a comforting atmosphere to explore after spending a year in Israel, where I had worked so hard to build an extended community of Jewish family and friends. Before Israel, I was extremely involved in United Synagogue Youth and my school, Solomon Schechter, where I spent years and years learning, singing, dancing, and smiling with old and new friends.

Essentially, I have been surrounded by built-in, young Jewish communities my entire life. When I began graduate school at Fordham University ("The Jesuit University of New York") and had to live at home rather than the ever popular and trendy Jewish communities of the Upper West Side or Washington Heights, I knew my

## Marching Toward Freedom

At the recent Celebrate Israel Parade, Dr. Ruth Westheimer was interviewed by Channel 9. She graciously thanked the anchors for their time and reminisced about her role as a sniper in the Hagana around the time of Israel's independence. She observed how the parade demonstrates support for Israel within and beyond the Jewish community. She also spoke about how parades like this one reveal the pervasive blessing of freedom in America. How fortunate we are, she remarked, that Jews, Latinos, Indians and others can march proudly up "fancy Fifth Avenue," fully integrated into American society while able to embrace the unique aspects of their respective cultures.

Bravo, Dr. Ruth. You always seem to find the right words for the occasion. Indeed the Celebrate Israel Parade is not only about Jewish support for Israel, it's about world recognition. Moreover, it is one of many ethnic parades that convey an important message about our country, namely the freedom and equality that every group deserves.

Unfortunately, in the State of Israel, religious freedom still eludes many Jews as the Conservative and Reform denominations of Judaism do not receive equal treatment under Israeli law. Recently, an important development took place that will hopefully begin to change that reality.

In response to a petition submitted in 2005, Israel's Attorney General recently agreed to recognize Masorti (Conservative) and Reform rabbis in Israel and to fund their salaries in limited circumstances. It only applies to rabbis in small towns and the funds are taken from the Ministry of Sports and Culture, rather than the Ministry of Religion. Moreover, the rabbis are still not allowed to exert influence regarding *halakhic* issues.

## Congregational Report

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** This column is adapted from the remarks made by President Alan Klinger at the opening of the recent congregational meeting.

I would like to give you a brief update on what has been achieved this past year.

We accomplished the hiring of a Director of Congregational Learning to achieve better continuity for our three school programs. We would like each year's curricula to build on itself to achieve a more robust learning experience. We believe this will improve the likelihood that more students will move from one program to the next. This initiative was started under former President Richie Kestenbaum,

where we determined that having an overall director of education would facilitate these goals. This year, a search committee headed by Trustee Miriam Kobliner oversaw a process in which dozens of resumes were received; more than a half dozen candidates were interviewed and, ultimately, a selection was made of Rabbi Amy Roth. Rabbi Roth will be here shortly to meet with teachers and members of our Religious School Education Committee and EVT Committees, to start the transition.

With change, however positive, comes some real sadness. Rabbi Klirs spent seven productive years with us, greatly improving our Religious School programming and becoming an important part of our *kehillah*. We wish her success in her next endeavor and ask you to join us at *Shabbat* services on June 16th, where we will recognize her devoted service.

We also accomplished, for the first time, reviews of clergy and our executive director. Former executive committee members reached out to various arms of the synagogue and interested congregants to solicit their views. The senior professionals were accorded the opportunity to express their thoughts as well. Your lay leadership found this to be a productive and meaningful process and believe that both the congregation and the senior professionals will benefit from it. Indeed, we have already seen progress from the exchange of ideas and obser-

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

religious and spiritual life was going to suffer.

For a year, I searched for temporary solutions. I visited my friends in Jewish communities in the City and became a frequent Shabbat guest. I started going with my friends to the Hofstra Chabad. However, my frustration only grew every time I had to return home: why could I not find a young, vibrant Jewish community in Great Neck, the most Jewish town I knew?

There was no official committee or meeting to jump start the "Great Neck College Grads Kabbalat Shabbat." It began slowly and informally, when Cheryl Moin suggested the idea and came up with a date for our first Kabbalat Shabbat. I created a Facebook page and event, and Erica Moin coordinated several logistical details. We both invited friends and discussed the upcoming event with Danny Mishkin. After talking to some of the future attendees, we decided to have a Kabbalat Shabbat service before the catered dinner.

I had no idea what to expect for that first Friday night. All I knew was that I was leading a service, some of my friends were attending. and some of Erica's friends were attending. We did not know how people would respond to the service or even to one another. After assembling the chairs in a circle, I awkwardly introduced myself and Danny suggested interspersing introductions into the service.

Erica and I both found that there were several people neither of us knew who had heard about the event through the Temple Israel Voice or other friends. It was clear that many people were unfamiliar with some of the prayers, but everyone was paying attention and following along. Once the service was over, the tension and unfamiliarity quickly dissipated: some of us began rekindling friendships with people we had not seen for years, and others sat with strangers and became fast friends by the end of the night. We had about 25 people, and it seemed as if everyone had the space to feel comfortable.

We mingled over good food and wine, and no one left until about 10:30. If we had been able to stay longer, I have no doubt that we would have. Our first Shabbat dinner was a success.

Over the course of the next few weeks, several discussions took place in terms of how to structure the evening and organize the events. After talking to various attendees, we decided to have a more abbreviated service and encouraged participants to include their own suggestions and opinions about the service. Erica created a Facebook event for the next Shabbat dinner and has continued to facilitate the Facebook events ever since.

Each Shabbat dinner has been different, with new themes and ideas (such as a beer-tasting with Rabbi Adelson) and new participants

each time, but a core group of young Jewish professionals have returned every time. We continue to have informal, casual services, along with introductions and icebreakers such as "highlights of the week." People have slowly begun to be more familiar with the services and have suggested different tunes and songs. No one ever leaves before 10 P.M., and many of these friendships have already extended beyond Friday night Shabbat dinners.

It is unclear whether or not this group will expand to celebrating other Jewish and social events or if it will remain as it is: a space for young Jews to come together and celebrate Shabbat, learning and friendship. Either way, the community and atmosphere that we have all created is special and valuable. I always anticipate these Shabbatot with excitement and enthusiasm, as I imagine reuniting with old friends, creating new ones, eating, laughing and even praying with people all around me who are all here for the same reason I am: to connect.

vations. We expect that the review exercise will extend to the remainder of our senior professionals and be continued on a periodic basis, involving the congregation in the endeavor.

We have also been gratified by the strengthened participation in synagogue committees. To highlight just a few: • Adult Education - Led by Rabbi Adelson, Trustee Rebecca Charry and Susan Wagner, the committee has worked to expand to a greater variety of programs. The goal is to recognize – and serve - the needs of our various constituencies. • House Committee – Led by Marty Werber, the group has focused on better utilization of our building space, starting with a re-opening of the third floor. We are working now on reclaiming the old Board Room and plans are in the works for a new handicap accessible bathroom. (I am also learning more about a/c systems, dry wells and plumbing than I ever cared to.) • Beth HaGan – You will hear from Rachel Mathless about the year's activities at the nursery school. But I would like to thank Trustee Joanna Eshaghoff for her leadership in our two-part Beth HaGan 50th Anniversary Celebration. It was a pleasure to see so many people be there for the Shabbat service and to see engaged families attend the celebration. As part of the effort's fundraising, we are hoping to secure sufficient funds for a new playground, complete with a rubberized resurfacing. (It is still possible to purchase commemorative pickets with your family's names for the new playground fence; contact Joanna or the office if interested.) • Website - We thank Trustee Jose Nebro for

his hard work getting a website up and running for us. Recently, work has continued as we expand the content, aiming for greater on-line capabilities for event and school registration, payments and donations.

- Security Committee Led by Joe Farber, we have been focused on better use of technology to improve our safety. Working with the committee, head of security Jerry White and Executive Director Leon Silverberg, we have applied to Homeland Security for a grant to fund new hardware.
- EVT/RSEC Representatives largely of these committees, led by Trustee Bracha Werber, worked this past year to "re-evaluate" our "Re-Imagine" project. The goal was to assess the program after some four years; that is, evaluate whether the judgments that were made as to what to emphasize/de-emphasize prove out. The group

recently issued a survey for parents and

teachers to assess these matters. The in-

formation will be furnished to Rabbi Roth

as part of her orientation to the program.

• Communications Committee - This new committee is looking at how we communicate with our members and potential members in the 21st Century. How do we best use The Voice, e-mail and social media? Please let us know if you would be interested in joining this (or any other) group.

Looking ahead to the High Holidays, we have concentrated on:

- Obtaining new *machzors*, to allow for better integration of commentary;
- Continuing to improve the sound systems in the main venues; and
- Procuring a new ark for the Main Ballroom.

We expect to complete these items shortly.

Looking a bit further ahead, you will soon receive the date for our annual gala, which will be held in the fall.

And, finally, an update on Rabbi Adelson's status. As you know, Rabbi Adelson is being considered for the senior position at Sutton Place Synagogue. He has made it to the final two candidates. We are proud of him and wish him well. We will have with us this coming *Shabbat* Rabbi Bluman, a candidate for the assistant rabbi position should Rabbi Adelson be selected. He will deliver the sermon at the service and be with us for other events. Please try to participate in these activities and share your impressions with us.

In an opinion piece, also for Ha'aretz,

Rabbi Julie Schoenfeld wrote that she hopes for the day when Judaism in contemporary Israel will embody the rabbinic dictum that recognizes multiple ways of fulfilling the Divine will: "These and those are the words of the living God." One indication of the embrace of truly pluralism will be equal funding for all approaches to Judaism.

It's crucial that we continue to support Israel in multiple ways. We are indebted to Rebecca and Sassan Sassouni, Helen Wrobel, Lee Harounian and the Israel Affairs Committee, Lisa Weinblatt, Jesse Smith and all who coordinated and participated in the Celebrate Israel Parade. Thanks to the efforts of Mike Delefraz and others, we hosted a successful Israel Bonds program last month. At the end of August, I will be joining a number of Temple Israel families on an action-packed trip to Israel.

Israel needs our support as she makes increasing strides in technology and confronts internal and external challenges. We will continue to march, visit and invest in Israel's future.

Finally, through our advocacy of Mercaz and our relationship with Kehillat Netzach Yisrael, our sister Masorti synagogue in Ashkelon, we will continue to support religious freedom for all Jews in Israel.

Our support in all these areas is crucial. As Dr. Ruth would say, we are all "on the air."

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#### D'var Torah By Rabbi Marim D. Charry

#### Behaalotekha Saturday, June 9

The march to the Promised Land finally begins in this portion. Among the last details dealt with at Sinai are preparation of the lamps of the menorah, dedication of the Levites to their duties, observance of Passover on the 14th day of the first month in the second year after the Exodus and the making of two silver trumpets to be sounded as a signal to assemble, to break camp or to take note of other special occasions. As soon as the people began their march, they began to complain. In response to Moses' cry for help, God instructs him to gather 70 elders to assist him in leading the people. Miriam and Aaron then challenge Moses' role as prophet. God vindicates Moses by punishing Miriam. These incidents of selfishness, even in the face of God's miracles, set a pattern that becomes a prominent theme of Scripture—the struggle to raise man above himself.

#### Shelah Saturday, June 16

In this portion, the Israelites approach the border of Canaan, and Moses sends 12 princes of the tribes to scout the land. Among them are Caleb and Joshua. The scouts' mission is to investigate the natural properties of the land and evaluate the strength of its people. After 40 days, the scouts return bearing a single cluster of grapes so heavy that it takes two men to carry it on a pole between them. They report that the land is indeed bountiful, but it is inhabited by powerful people living in fortified cities. The scouts maintain that the Israelites are too weak to conquer the land, but Caleb and Joshua argue that, if the people have faith in God and His promise, they will be able to overcome the inhabitants. The people accept the majority report, thus incurring God's wrath. He decrees that they will spend 40 years in the wilderness, until an entire generation dies out and a free generation grows up.
